

### **Regents approve clinic purchase**

The North Texas State University Board of Regents, TCOM's governing body, recommended that TCOM purchase a physician's clinic and approved seven new appointments at the regular meeting June 17 in Denton.

The request to buy the clinic, located at 901 Montgomery, was made on the recommendation of the Facilities Committee. Following the meeting, Dr. Ralph L. Willard, dean, said the property will be used to establish a surgical specialty clinic with full-time faculty.

New faculty members approved are Dr. David Barker, assistant professor of physiology; Dr. Clinton Burns, instructor of osteopathic philosophy, principles and practice; Dr. William Hinsberg, associate professor of general and family practice; Dr. Irwin Schussler, associate professor of psychiatry; and Dr. Stephen Urban, assistant professor of general and family practice.

Joining the administrative staff as acting director of public information

is Dr. Judy Alter. Ann Mullins Watley, formerly technical services librarian, was appointed acting director of library services following the resignation of Joan Swaim.

Prior to joining TCOM, Dr. Barker was an assistant professor of physiology and biophysics at the University of Illinois at Urbana. He has done postdoctoral work at the University of Wisconsin in neurophysiology and received his Ph.D. and M.A. degrees in psychology from the University of Illinois at Urbana. Dr. Barker received a B.A. degree in psychology from Hofstra University in Hampstead, N.Y.

A 1956 graduate of Kansas City College of Osteopathic Medicine, Dr. Hinsberg has been in private practice in family medicine in Warren, Mich., prior to joining TCOM. He received a B.S. degree in pharmacy from the Detroit College of Pharmacy in 1951. Dr. Hinsberg also took psychiatric training at Temple University in Philadelphia. Pa., from 1970-71
