All students of T.C.O.M., and especially the Class of 1976, I salute you for your dedication to the medical profession, but more importantly for your devotion to life.

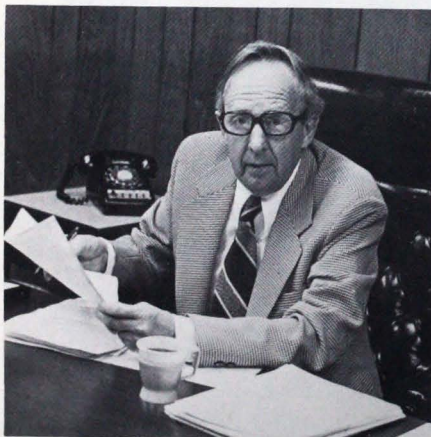

In the fall of 1972, Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine's first year on the North Texas State University campus, I began my association with the medical school. I realized the necessity of learning more about the Osteopathic profession in the clinical setting so that anatomy courses could be improved to produce student efficiency in clinical courses. Just as the human body functions best as a harmonious whole, a school is most effective when the various departments work together to create a whole picture of medicine for the student.

To get a clearer view of the harmony and totality of life as embodied in Osteopathy, I spent a summer observing at Fort Worth Osteopathic Hospital. The departments of Surgery, Pathology, Osteopathic Philosophy, Principles and Practice, and Rehabilitation Medicine graciously allowed me to observe and extend my knowledge. In addition, the experience was very enjoyable and invaluable in broadening my understand-

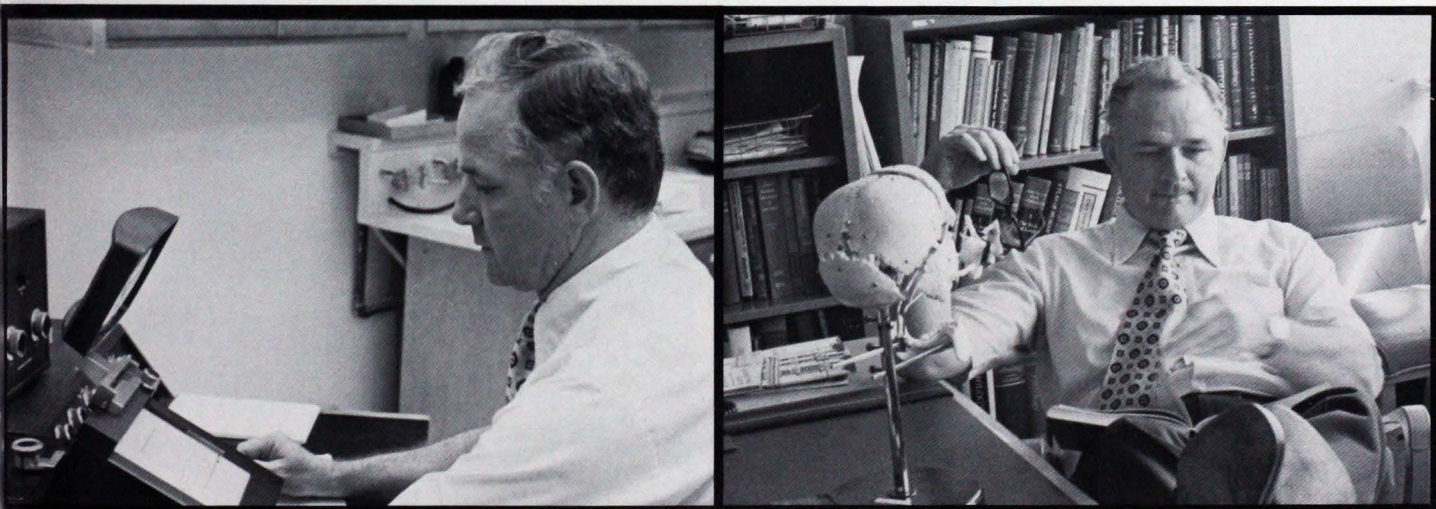
ing of structure and function interdependence. As I was expanding, so were the school's means.

With opulent funding, we could enlarge teaching facilities. Visual aids became an important part of our course system, improved course synthesis and alleviated somnolence. The trend continues as we utilize new equipment with insight and work to provide in our teaching facilities a superior atmosphere for gaining compassionate skills.

To bring a "dead" subject alive is a meritorious ambition. My idea is to present as much basic anatomy - laced with clinical application as I can. At times it must seem that the material load is too heavy, but only difficult achievements arm students with the skills that patients respect and deserve. Such a task does not have to be an unbearable strain. Every drama needs comic relief, and I try to relieve the trauma of learning such a plethora of material. After all, teaching is a learning experience also, and just as Osteopathy is only

in its infancy, we are led by the unknown to build as far as we can our wisdom of life. If we teach such principles, we will be teaching knowledge and health, not knowledge of death.

In the past few years, gross anatomy has been attacked by other departments in basic medical sciences throughout the nation. The trend is to reduce time in the curriculum devoted to anatomy, and with this has come a reduction in respect for, and difficulty in finding, teachers of gross anatomy who are allowed to take pride in their chosen field of medical education. The complete subjugation of anatomy so that it is practically eliminated will lead to ignorance of the interdependence of structure and function, and without such knowledge, the physician cannot begin to apply the law of cause and effect. A profound concept of Osteopathy is that a thorough knowledge of anatomy and physiology provides the first line of investigation from the presenting problem



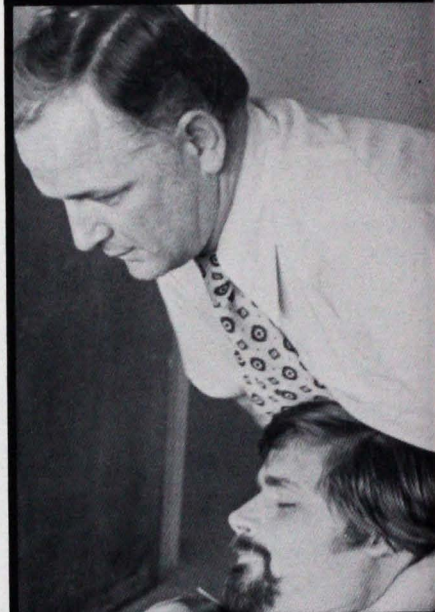
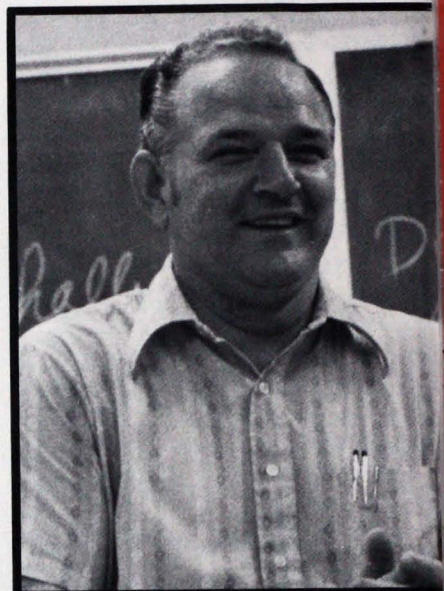

or effect to the structural origin of the cause. In our efforts to streamline, let us be sure we do not pass over knowledge which makes our skill less than it could be. If there must be a modification in the medical school curriculum it should not be gained at the expense of any one basic subject in medical education. There must be communication and cooperation between teachers of the basic medical sciences and teachers

of the art and practice of the application of basic medical scientific facts to establish a curriculum which will provide the medical student with the fundamental knowledge which will allow him to improve the treatment of his patients. Such a plan allows teachers time for research and advanced study, and it also allows teachers to educate doctors to treat patients.

Medicine is a discipline comprised of a physician's educational and clinical experiences. The education of a physician begins during the first days of medical school, when the student is given seemingly overwhelming amounts of material to study, much of which seems directly unrelated to medicine. Those who persist in their studies, however, soon find that occasionally they are rewarded with some educational material which seems allied to medicine, and hope is rekindled that in the far horizons of this career of medicine, lies an end called graduation with all the rights and privileges of a physician. Through the student's first and second years of medical school, the anticipation and excitement of this final goal is exceeded only by personal sacrifice and dedication to a hope.

The student physician then progresses to another level in the educational process beginning the clinical years of their training. It soon becomes apparent that much of what has been studied in pre-clinical years is unrelated to patient care, and the

student physician initially experiences hostility and frustration toward those responsible for their education for having not better prepared them for this completely alien encounter of patient contact. As the years progress toward graduation, the hostility and frustration are either sublimated or lost, but the student physician continues to feel perhaps another school, different educators, might have better prepared them for the answers that are not readily available when dealing with patients. Then the marvelous experience of graduation and the osteopathic oath, and all the accolades and rightfully earned congratulations.

After a brief month of reflection, the graduate physician again feels a freshening anxiety preceeding internship; self examination of one's capabilities, a compacting of knowledge with fellow interns, and the ever present knowledge that one can never be completely competent. But, as this year progresses, a new awakening begins, borne of new found skills and the embryonic beginnings

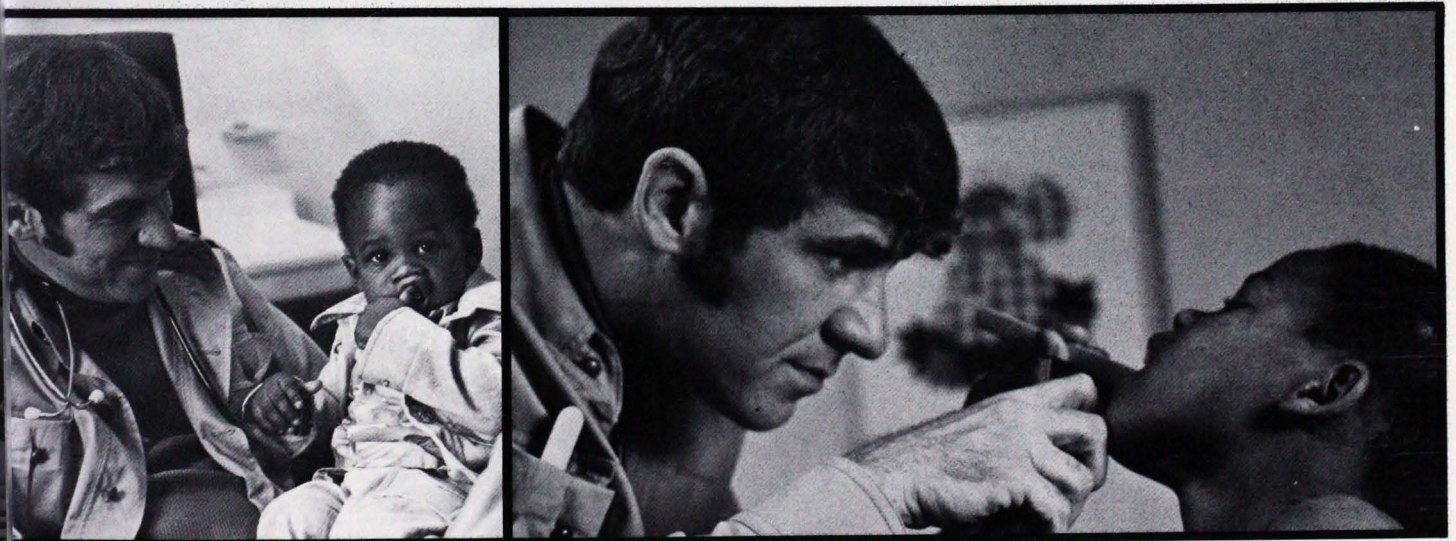
of self-confidence.

During the later phases of internship, the physician will make a decision which will change their entire progressive career, and choose an area of medicine in which to practice i.e., surgery, obstetrics, pediatrics, etc.

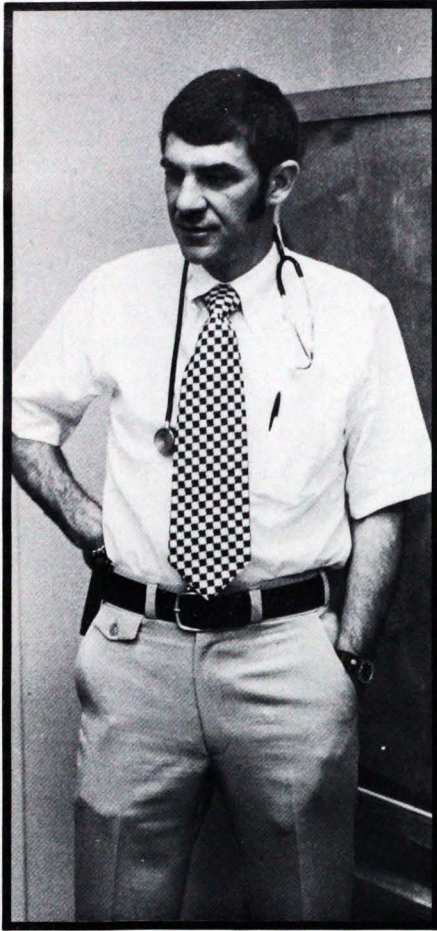
Skills, competence, self-confidence and knowledge are commonplace, but again a new unsettling emotion pervades; knowledge that still has to be learned.

The pre-clinical years of training should have taught the physician self-discipline. The next phase of training, the basics of dealing with patients and extracting information from them in a professional, courteous manner, and applying this information to treating patients. The internship provides the physician with a living library and laboratory to gain more knowledge, apply self discipline, and to exercise professionalism under skilled supervision.

All phases of training were necessary to provide the physician with maturity which could be gained in no other way. And, when all phases

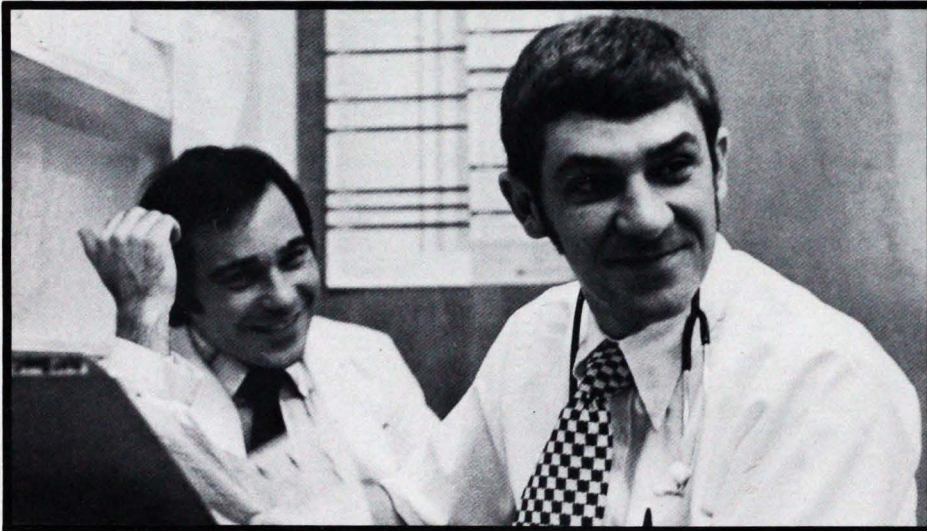


clinical science award



of training are complete, we are suddenly provided with the answer to our elusive anxieties of yesteryear. We find we are now qualified only as students of medicine, and now we must proceed with our own consciences providing us with the important linking of educational based reasoning and patient care. For no one but ourselves can teach us medicine; they can only give us the tools with which to teach ourselves. We are all students of medicine no matter what professional endeavor we have pursued. For medicine is an art and not a science. It is a gift bestowed upon us to be cherished for life.

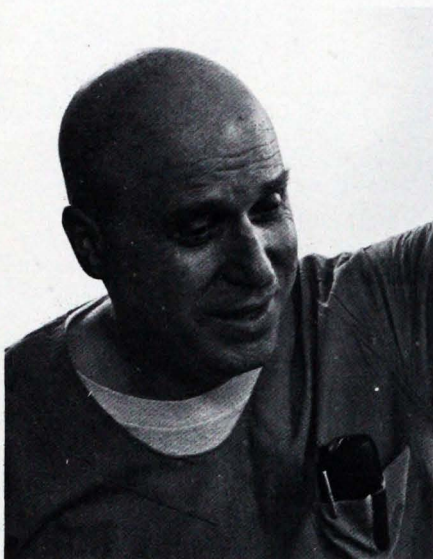
