Baldwin assumes new duties

Dr. Richard Baldwin, associate professor of general and family practice, has been named acting assistant dean of clinical affairs effective December 11, announced Dr. Ralph L. Willard,

Dr. Baldwin will assume administrative responsibilities previously held by Dr. Charles Kline, who served as associate dean for clinical affairs. Dr. Kline is returning to fulltime teaching as professor and chairman of the department of pediatrics.

Dr. Baldwin, former associate professor of family practice at Michigan State University College of Osteopathic Medicine, has been on the NTSU/ TCOM faculty since 1976. A native of Oklahoma, he is the son of Dr. Howard Baldwin, a practicing osteopathic surgeon in Tulsa.

The new assistant dean is a 1964 graduate of the University of Oklahoma and received his D.O. degree in 1968 from Kansas City College of Osteopathic Medicine. He interned at Oklahoma Osteopathic Hospital in Tulsa.

In 1969-70 Dr. Baldwin was in solo general practice in Oklahoma and spent 1971 in group practice in Tucker, Georgia, before joining the faculty at MSUCOM.

Dr. Bluestone to speak

Dr. Naomi Bluestone of New York City will be on campus January 11 to speak on women in medicine at a joint meeting of the Women Students' Organization and the Student Government Association. Faculty coordinator for the residency program in social medicine at Montefiore Hospital in the Bronx, Dr. Bluestone is best known for her monthly column in Medical Dimensions dealing with the social aspects of medical practice, humanism in medicine and the emerging role of women in medicine.

A graduate of Women's Medical College of Pennsylvania, Dr. Bluestone has taught at medical colleges and allied health schools in the New York area, including Mt. Sinai School of Medicine and Albert Einstein College of Medicine. She has taken residency and post-doctoral training in public health and has previously served as assistant commissioner of chronic and long-term care for the New York

City Department of Health.

Dr. Bluestone's medical writing career began while she was still a student with the publication of "Golden Years as Seen by a Second-Year Medical Student," an article which appeared in Philadelphia Medicine in 1960. Currently she is a contributing editor with Medical Dimensions, editor of Woman MD (a new journal for women physicians, now in preparation) and a member of the publications committee of the Journal of the American Medical Women's Association. Her articles have appeared in both academic and popular professional publications, and typical titles include "The Annotated Hippocrates," "Doctors Wanted: No Women Need Apply" (a book review), "You Can't Get Sick, You're a Doctor," "Byline Fever" and "Death of a Salesperson."
