# Survey results available

The 1978 Fort Worth Citizen Social Survey, conducted by the Department of Sociology at Texas Christian University, included 22 items concerning health care and physicians which were specifically designed to assess public knowledge and attitudes toward osteopathic medicine and TCOM. The 22 items were prepared by Dr. Barry Tuchfeld, assistant professor of sociology at TCU, and Dr. Judy Alter of the News and Information Office, in consultation with Dean Ralph L. Willard.

The results of the survey and an interpretation by Dr. Tuchfeld were made available to TCOM in October. Not surprisingly, they support the need for TCOM's continued efforts at general public education. Dr. Tuchfeld strongly recommends interim evaluation of TCOM's public education programs and suggests that the major importance of this study is to serve as a base against which progress can be measured.

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Plans call for formal presentation of this report to department chairmen at a future date, but the report is available in the Office of News and Information Services for any faculty member who wishes to read it.
