#### What's in a name?

Though the agenda was brief, some major recommendations involving NTSU/TCOM were approved by the NTSU Board of Regents at its last meeting May 18 in Denton.

The regents approved, with little discussion, the following six recommendations submitted by Hugh Wolfe, chairman of the TCOM liaison

commettee:

That the name on Medical Education
Building I and on all graphics and insignias be —
NTSU/TCOM Texas College of Osteopathic
Medicine:

 That the campus of the Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine be developed according to the April 1978 Master Plan update as approved by

the Board of Regents:

 That the Board of Regents of NTSU/TCOM seek and welcome suggestions and advice from the duly elected officers of the Texas Osteopathic Medical Association;

 That the TCOM Committee (of the Board) be abolished in favor of full service and attention of all standing committees that now serve NTSU;

That the Acting President develop a policy for approval by the Board for all interagency contracts between NTSU and TCOM;

 That the NTSU/TCOM Board of Regents support the Senate and House Bill that will authorize a President of NTSU, a President of TCOM and a Chancellor to serve both NTSU and TCOM

Especially significant was the vote to develop the TCOM campus according to the Master Plan of April 1978, which shows Med Ed II to be built along Mattison Street. Earlier that day the Board heard a report from the architectural firm of Fisher & Spillman who had developed, at the request of the regents, an alternate siting for the basic science building in the present parking lot between Mattison and Camp Bowie. (The alternate plan was ordered by the Board after it became doubtful that funds would be available to purchase the necessary land to complete the master plan as originally designed.)

The Board also approved the appointment, effective July 1, of Tom King, 39, as assistant to the vice-president for medical affairs and dean. King, associate administrator for the Bexar County Hospital District in San Antonio, graduated from Texas Christian University with a B.B.A. degree in 1966 and from Trinity University in 1969 with a master of science degree in

Or chospital administration. He was assistant administrator for the Tarrant County Hospital District for five years before going to San Antonio in 1973.

In other action, the regents approved:

'an increase in the amount of space to be leased for the proposed Godley family practice clinic in Godley, Texas, and for the physical plant division in Fort Worth;

\*Continental National Bank, First National Bank of Fort Worth and Ridglea State Bank as depositories for the college:

"the expenditure of \$150,000 for the purchase of moveable wall partitions and accessories "to accommodate changing programs";

\*promotion from assistant professor to associate professor for Drs. James E. Carnes, anatomy; Thomas E. Croley, anatomy; and Myron K. Jacobson, biochemistry; and

\*tenure for Dr. Elizabeth F. Harris, chairman of microbiology and immunology.


Mrs. Smith asks that persons interested in the courses mark their calendars and look for further information in upcoming issues of **Dateline**.


