Regents name Carter acting president

It's not that John Carter has any great desire to be president of one of the state's largest universities and one of its fastest growing medical schools. He is generally content with being one of Texas' most respected higher education fiscal officers.

But for the second time in less than 10 years he has been asked to take the reins of NTSU during what one newspaper referred to as "troubled times."

Carter, who served as acting president of NTSU for a year beginning in August 1970, was named to the post again last week by the Board of Regents following the resignation of President C.C. Nolen.

In a statement dated April 12, Regents Chairman A.M. Willis Jr. noted: "The Board of Regents of North Texas State University has met in an emergency session in Austin on April 12, 1979. The Board received and accepted the resignation of C.C. Nolen as President of North Texas State University effective immediately. The Board has asked Mr. John L. Carter, Vice President for Fiscal Affairs, to be acting President of North Texas until the next Board meeting which will be held toward the end of this month."

Submitting his resignation to the Board April 12, President Nolen said he was "aware of the responsibility of that position for any questions involving the management or operation of the University. My sincere hope is that the air can be cleared soon concerning the many allegations which often times have been based on inaccurate

or misleading information. I welcome any thorough investigation, because to my knowledge each allegation thus far presented has a valid answer."

The statement referred to allegations made in a series of stories carried by area news media and to an impending legislative investigation involving charges of mismanagement at both NTSU and NTSU/TCOM.

While the investigation continues, Carter has assumed the presidency of both schools until the next Regents' meeting April 27 in Denton, at which time the Board will decide what steps to take in seeking a new president for the university.

Carter once before served as acting president while a search committee sought a replacement for Dr. John Kamerick, who left in 1970 to assume the presidency of the University of Northern Iowa. It was after a year-long search that President Nolen was hired away from his vice chancellorship at Texas Christian University.

Carter joined the NTSU staff in 1955 as chief accountant and was named comptroller in 1961. In 1965 he became vice president for fiscal affairs, and now also holds the title of treasurer of the university.

A 1946 graduate of the University of Texas at Austin, Carter became a CPA in 1950. He served in the U.S. Army Medical Corps from 1943-46 and later worked for an accounting firm, the University of Texas and the State Auditor's Office. He and his wife Lela, have two children, Bill and Elizabeth.

Some NTSU/TCOM staff, students and faculty need to pull out Administrative Letter 78-5 and take a second look at it, according to Physical Plant Director John Peveto.

In that letter, Dean Ralph Willard stated that walls, doors and surfaces at Med Ed I should not be defaced with notices, advertisements or posters.

Peveto says the policy is being ignored, and many walls and doors have required repainting or refinishing to repair damage done by cellophane tape and thumbtacks used to attach notices to them.

"We do have bulletin boards up for notices," Peveto said. "But we have had to repaint the first and second floors of Med Ed I next to the elevators."

The custodial staff has been instructed to remove notices on off-limits surfaces, and Peveto asks that staff, faculty and students who are concerned about the appearance of the building do the same.
