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## Blood Donor Day set for Dec. 10

Blood Donor Day -- what does it mean to you? It is an opportunity for you to join the Fort Worth Osteopathic Hospital-TCOM Blood Reserve Fund and an opportunity to help the Fort Worth community.

An annual event jointly sponsored by FWOH and TCOM, this year's Blood Donor Day has been expanded from one to two days, Dec. 9 and 10. Carter Blood Center will be set up in the East-West Meeting Rooms at FWOH from 9 a.m. - 6 p.m., Dec. 9 and in the TCOM Student Center from 11 a.m. - 1:30 p.m., Dec. 10.

This year's drive has been expanded and set up at TCOM in order to give both the second and third year students an opportunity to participate and to make donating more convenient for both students and employees. The second year class will be attending classes in Fort Worth on Dec. 10.

A goal of 150 pints of blood has been set by both FWOH and TCOM. TCOM hopes to collect 50 pints. Last year the blood drive collected 133 pints in five hours.

By donating a pint of blood you automatically become a member of the FWOH-TCOM Blood Reserve Fund which assures you and members of your immediate family of always having blood available whenever the need might arise.

Donors do not have to make any special preparations before donating blood. But, representatives of Carter Blood Center advise that you eat a light meal or snack about 30 minutes prior to donating blood. This is not necessary, but they have found it can help lessen any possible after effects.

If you are between the ages of 18 and 65 inclusive, weigh at least 110 pounds and are in good health, you are eligible to give blood. Persons who have had hepatitis, thrombophlebitis, malaria and syphilis cannot give blood.



It only takes about 20 minutes to give the "Gift of Life". Half the population of the United States is eligible to give blood, but only three per cent do give. If all the eligible persons would give blood just once in 16 years, it would cover all this country's foreseeable needs, according to information from Carter Blood Center.

Assisting the Carter Blood Center personnel with registering donors and serving orange juice and cookies will be members of the Students' Wives Auxiliary.

In an effort to estimate how many donors will participate, pledge lists will be sent to department heads and persons planning on donating blood are asked to sign the list.

Each person donating blood will receive a heart which reads "I've Given, Have You?"
