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TCOM adds new teaching hospital

TCOM has added another hospital to the list of affiliated teaching facilities. The Regional Hospital at Carswell Air Force Base has become the first military hospital to affiliate with TCOM and brings the total number of college affiliated teaching hospitals to seven. The announcement was made by Dr. Ralph L. Willard, dean.

Under the terms of the agreement signed in Fort Worth and forwarded to the U.S. surgeon general, the hospital becomes a college affiliate for the purpose of training TCOM students. Sixteen upper level students will receive clinical training at the hospital in surgery, medicine, obstetrics and synecology and pediatrics.

Dr. Willard said the new affiliation would benefit both the college and the Air Force. He noted that it would widen the clinic experiences available to the student doctors and those students on military scholarships will have an early opportunity to experience the distinctive aspects of military medicine. Dr. Willard said the Air Force, in turn, will get an early look at prospective officers and patients in the USAF hospital will benefit by the expansion of the health care team.
