

The following part-time faculty members have become fulltime this fall:

JOEL ALTER, D.O., associate professor of surgery - A graduate of the Kirkville College of Osteopathic Medicine, Dr. Alter did his internship in Kirkville and took a surgical residency at FWOH. He has practiced in Fort Worth since completing a surgical residency at FWOH in 1968. Always active at TCOM, Dr. Alter served as clinical coordinator from 1969-70 and was acting chairman of the department of surgery for several years. He is the author of several papers and is certified in general surgery.

DAVID L. BILYEA, D.O., associate professor of surgery - A native of Louisiana, Mo., Dr. Bilyea attended the Kirkville College of Osteopathic Medicine and practiced in his hometown for several years before moving to Michigan where he took a residency in general surgery followed by a fellowship in pulmonary medicine. He has been in practice in Fort Worth since 1970 and a part-time faculty member since 1972.

WAYNE R. ENGLISH, D.O., chairman and professor of rehabilitation/sports medicine - A graduate of Franklin and Marshall College and the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine, Dr. English taught at the Kirkville College for seven years prior to coming to Fort Worth, where he has practiced since 1973. Former consulting physician to the Boston Celtics professional basketball team, Dr. English is the author of several published papers on sports medicine and is a member of the American Osteopathic College of Rehabilitation Medicine and the American Osteopathic Academy of Sports Medicine, the AOA and TOMA.

W.R. JENKINS, D.O., chairman and professor of surgery - A native of Fort Worth, Dr. Jenkins received his B.S. from Texas Wesleyan College and the D.O. from the Kirkville College of Osteopathic Medicine. He interned in Kirkville and was in general practice before taking a surgical residency at FWOH. He has been in private practice in Fort Worth as a surgeon since 1968. Dr. Jenkins has had papers published in osteopathic publications and presented to postgraduate meetings. Active in the osteopathic profession, he is a trustee to TOMA, and has been a member of the AOA House of Delegates. He is on the Board of FWOH and is a former chief of staff at that hospital.

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## Meet the new faculty and staff

In this exciting period of fast growth new faces join the people of TCOM so rapidly that it is hard for most of us to keep up. This special issue of Dateline tries to meet that problem by introducing new faculty and staff.

We welcome the following fulltime faculty members:

ELMER A. BROWN, M.S., lecturer in rehabilitation/sports medicine - Brown, who taught at TCU for 27 years, holds an M.S. from NTSU and has done post-graduate work at the University of Tennessee and the University of Texas at El Paso. He is a member of the National Athletic Trainers Association, the National Physical Education Association, the Southwestern Athletic Trainers Association and the State Teachers Association and has written a teaching manual for the NATA. Brown has conducted workshops in Germany, England, Greece, Turkey and Spain and served as Head Trainer for the Olympic Team in 1956. A former world record holder in track, he received the Royal Purple Award from TCU and has been elected to the Hall of Fame for Athletic Trainers.

PHILLIP COHEN, D.O., assistant professor of medicine - Dr. Cohen, a 1973 graduate of the College of Osteopathic Medicine and Surgery, took both his internship and his residency training in internal medicine at Martin Place Hospital in



Detroit and was in private practice at that hospital prior to joining TCOM. He is a member of the AOA and the Michigan Association of Osteopathic Physicians.

EDWARD ELKO, Ph.D., professor of pharmacology - Dr. Elko holds a Ph.D. from the University of Tennessee Medical Units in Memphis and has taught at that school since 1969, with responsibilities for both graduate and professional programs. He is the author of numerous published papers and abstracts and is a member of Sigma Xi, the Reticuloendothelial Society, American Society of Pharmacology and Experimental Therapeutics, and a special affiliate of the AMA.

FRANK FALBEY, D.O., director of medical education/director of clinical clerk education, Mid Cities Academic Health Center/Grand Prairie Community Hospital - Dr. Falbey, who recently completed a tour of duty with the United States Air Force in Zaragoza, Spain, also holds an appointment as associate professor of general and family practice. For over 20 years, he was in private practice in Springfield, Pa., where he was one of the founders of the Tri-County Hospital and was an assistant professor in the department of physiology and pharmacology at the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine. A 1952 graduate of PCOM, he has served as an examiner in physiology for the National Board of Examiners for Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons. Dr. Falbey is a member of the AOA and the Pennsylvania Osteopathic Association.

NOEL FUNDERBURK, Ph.D., assistant professor of microbiology - Dr. Funderburk holds a B.S. from Baylor and M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from NTSU. He previously taught at the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio and was director of Microbial Pathology at the Audie Murphy V.A. Hospital in San Antonio. The author of several published papers, Dr. Funderburk has done research at UTHSC/San Antonio, NTSU and the Johnson Manned Space Center, NASA.

RICHARD C. HOCHBERGER, D.O., assistant professor of pediatrics - Dr. Hochberger, a 1975 graduate of TCOM, is the first alumnus to return to the faculty after residency training in a specialty. His internship and pediatrics residency were taken at Doctors Hospital in Columbus, Ohio, where he was Chief Pediatric Resident. Dr. Hochberger is a member of the

American College of Osteopathic Pediatricians, Sigma Sigma Phi and the TCOM Alumni Association. He presented a paper entitled "Varicella Hepatitis in Children" to the International Conference on Reye's Syndrome in Halifax, Nova Scotia, and is the author of "Perspectives on Drug Abuse," published by the Brooklyn College Ad-Hoc Committee on Drug Abuse.

CONSTANCE I. JENKINS, D.O., assistant professor of general and family practice - A graduate of the Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine, Dr. Jenkins has practiced in Atlanta, Mo; Franklin and Granbury, Tx., and since 1967, in Fort Worth. She is a member of the AOA, TOMA and the American College of General Practitioners, Texas society. Dr. Jenkins, who has been a member of the voluntary faculty since the early days of TCOM, is the wife of W.R. Jenkins, D.O., professor and chairman of the department of surgery.

JOHN W. KAUZLARICH, D.O., assistant professor of rehabilitation/sports medicine - A 1973 graduate of the Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine, Dr. Kauzlarich has been in private practice in Florida. From 1975 to 1978 he was director of the Sports Medicine Clinic of Florida in Tampa and team physician for the Tampa Bay Rowdies, professional soccer club, which won the North American League Championship in 1975 and was runner-up in 1978. Dr. Kauzlarich's articles on sports medicine have appeared in Osteopathic Annals and The Physician and Sports Medicine. He is a member of the AOA and the American Osteopathic Academy of Sports Medicine and an advisory member of the of the American College of Sports Medicine and the National Athletic Trainers Association.

IRVIN M. KORR, Ph.D., professor of medical education - introduced fully in a recent issue of DATELINE, Dr. Korr is a well-known osteopathic research scientist. He taught at the Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine for thirty years and has recently been at the Michigan State College of Osteopathic Medicine. At TCOM, he will work closely with the department of medical humanities to promote interdisciplinary teaching and will work with the curriculum committee toward defining the ideal curriculum for a college of osteopathic medicine.

JAMES R. MARSHALL, D.O., associate professor of pediatrics - Dr. Marshall comes

to TCOM from the department of pediatrics, Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, where he took a two-year fellowship in neonatology. Prior to that, he was assistant professor of pediatrics at the Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine and Medical Director and Pediatrics Consultant at the Kirksville Regional Center for the Developmentally Disabled. A native of Fort Worth and a 1971 graduate of KCOM, he is a member of the AOA, the American College of Osteopathic Pediatricians and TOMA. An article by Dr. Marshall, "Treatment of Respiratory Diseases in Children" appeared in Maternal and Child Health in 1973.

MATTHEW J. MAUGHAN, D.O., assistant professor of radiology - A graduate of the Chicago College of Osteopathic Medicine, Dr. Maughan recently completed a residency in radiology at Parkland and Veteran's hospitals in Dallas. Prior to that, he was in general practice in Irving for 17 years. He is a member of the AOA and TOMA and has held staff offices at Doctors Community Hospital in Euless.

JOHN MEASEL JR., Ph.D., assistant professor of microbiology - Dr. Measel received his B.A. from Henderson State College, an M.A. from East Texas State University and the Ph.D. in microbiology from the University of Oklahoma in 1970. A native of Texarkana, he has done post-doctoral study at Purdue University and holds an American Academy of Microbiology Public Health Specialist Certificate. A former faculty member at the University of New Orleans and Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine, he is author of numerous published articles and has presented many papers at professional society meetings.

H. HUSAIN MUMTAZ, MBBS, associate professor of medicine - Dr. Mumtaz holds medical degrees from King Edward College in Lahore, Pakistan, and the College of Tropical Medicine in London. A member of the Royal College of Physicians of London and the British Medical Association, he has taught in Pakistan, the United Kingdom and the United States, and since 1970 has been chief of developmental therapy of the UT Health Science Center in Tyler (formerly East Texas Chest Hospital) where he has an outstanding reputation among TCOM students on rotation there.

VERNEY L. SALLEE, Ph.D., assistant professor of physiology - Dr. Sallee graduated from Hardin-Simmons University and received his Ph.D. in physiology from the University of New Mexico in 1970. He was a postdoctoral fellow in the department of internal medicine at the University of Texas Health Science Center in Dallas, and for the past six years has been assistant professor of physiology at that institution. A member of the American Physiology Society, he is the author of several published papers and abstracts.

JAY H. SHORES, Ph.D., associate professor of medical education - Dr. Shores received his doctoral degree in educational systems management and research design from the University of Wisconsin. He has taught in the Glen Ellyn (Ill.) public schools, at the University of Wisconsin, the University of Mexico, and most recently, at the University of Houston where he was assistant professor of foundations of education. At TCOM, he will work closely with the faculty in designing and teaching courses. Dr. Shores is the author of numerous articles and technical reports on educational methods. His research in progress concerns success in professional preparation programs and an evaluation of a professional pharmacy program.

ROBERT WORDINGER, Ph.D., assistant professor of anatomy - A native of Philadelphia, Dr. Wordinger received his doctorate from Clemson University where he studied animal physiology. He has most recently been assistant professor of pathology at the University of Arkansas Medical School and before that was head of the histology division of the National Center for Toxicological Research. Dr. Wordinger has also taught at St. Bonaventure University and was a post-doctoral fellow in the University of Pennsylvania School of Veterinary Medicine. The author of several articles, he is a member of the Histochemical Society, American Association for the Advancement of Science, New York Academy of Science and Society for the Study of Reproduction. Dr. Wordinger is currently working on the ultrastructure and histochemistry of the oviduct and uterus in mice exposed to synthetic hormones. This study is a joint effort with the National Center for Toxicological Research which is an FDA laboratory for the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.
