Don't forget to attend "What about Nutrition?," a day-long seminar Saturday, April 7, in Room 506 of Med Ed I. Sponsored by Sigma Sigma Phi and the Office of Continuing Medical Education, the seminar will feature three NTSU/TCOM faculty members: Dr. Stevan Cordas, clinical assistant professor of medicine; Dr. James Marshall, associate professor of pediatrics; and Dr. Irwin Schussler, associate professor of psychiatry.

Dr. Jaime Davidson, medicine instructor at the University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas/Southwestern Medical School; Dr. Ivan Danhof, professor of physiology at Southwestern; and Dr. John Locke, internal medicine consultant to Grand Prairie Community Hospital and Hurst General Hospital, also will speak at the seminar.

Topics on the agenda include neonatal nutrition, hyperalimentation, the importance of nutrition in diabetes, anorexia nervosa, obesity and fad diets and modern methods of understanding food and tolerance.
