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VANDIVER COFFEE SET FOR WEDNESDAYTO

Faculty and staff are invited to a get-acquainted coffee with President Frank Vandiver on Wednesday, March 12. Dr. Vandiver, who takes the reins of NTSU and TCOM fulltime on Aug. 1, will begin the afternoon with a short talk in Med Ed I's auditorium at 2:30, followed by coffee in the atrium.

Until Aug. 1, Dr. Vandiver will be spending much of his time in Houston as vice president and provost at Rice University. The widely acclaimed historian will be formally inaugurated at NTSU in the fall.

Dr. Vandiver has described himself as an administrator with an informal style, a liking for quick decisions and a close partnership with the faculty. In a talk to NTSU faculty in January, he said, "I'm not formal, but I like some semblance of order. I like an open door for faculty and staff and will be glad to give appointments to all, but I wouldn't want this system to be a way of end-running vice presidents, deans and supervisors.

"I'm not really a hip-shooter but will make decisions. I try to keep an open ear, and I'm not adverse to admitting mistakes--although I bite nails doing it. I'm a phoner. I try to keep memoranda and such clutter to a minimum."

He added that he believes in sharing discussions and burdens and in collective problem-solving.

He called faculties "the hearts of universities--hearts that infuse fresh ideas into the minds of later times." He continued, "As they must push back the boundaries of knowledge to be proper teachers, faculties shape another function of modern universities--research. Discovery is the essence of learning, and campuses ought to be centers of discovery.

"Faculties reach out beyond the campus in all kinds of community service--consulting, counseling, advising and when they do, they reinforce the value of their school. Vol.5/No.13

"So we ought to be judged as teachers, learners and interactors, but I think our most important function is as researchers."

ACCREDITATION TEAM DUE SUNDAY

RESCHEDULED BURNS LECTURE MARCH 19

Dr. Chester R. Burns, an authority in the fields of medical history and philosophy, will speak at TCOM on Wednesday, March 19. His talk on "The Many Faces of Health" was originally scheduled for Feb. 7.

Dr. Burns, who holds both the M.D. and Ph.D. degrees, is associate director of the Institute for the Medical Humanities, UT Medical Branch in Galveston. It is part of TCOM's "The Many Faces of Man" series made possible by a grant from the Texas Committee for the Humanities.
